Thinning Honey

And, as often as not, this spring's handbag will attract attention for its vibrant color.

There is smart accessory teamwork in the bag and gloves shown in today's photograph. The soft top-handle pouch bag, its navy gabardine gathered full on a plastic tortoise frame, repeats the draped lines of the long navy taffeta and jersey gloves.

Sketch #1. Cobra is an exotic reptile skin that has an affinity for the new suits. This

plump shape with its bracelet handle has accent possibilities in brown, red or green. #2. The sparkle of black plastic patent is synonymous with spring, and becomes all the more brilliant through the deftly manipulated folds of this unusual style.

Sketch #3. A boxed cushion shape of brown alligator is zippered on two sides to provide a generous opening beneath its twin handles of mock tortoise. #4. Jack-olanterns inspire new tapered lines in a square box bag of stitched black calfskin. Red leather lining shows a flash of color when the lid lifts. #5.
