There is smart accessory teamwork in the bag and gloves shown in today's photograph. The soft top-handle pouch bag, its navy gabardine gathered full on a plastic tortoise frame, repeats the draped lines of the long navy taffeta and jersey gloves.

If our young people seem selfish, rude and unthinking, if they don't seem to be doing very well as parents, we older folks who raised them must bear some of the blame. What, for instance, is back of the parental attitude described by this young woman who signs herself "Bubbles"? She writes:

"Dear Martha Foster: "I am in ninth grade and 13 years old. We have a very nice home, with beautiful furniture and all the latest conveniences and everything else just so. It's really magnificent. I am an only child, and have lovely clothes, but the thing that bothers me is my parents. "They are both only 28, and both work. So I always have to get the supper, and do all my own washing and ironing and everything else. Even if my mother is home she is usually tired and just loafs on the sofa with a cigaret and a drink. They are hardly ever home, but they forbid me to bring in any of my friends to visit. "It's all right for my mother and father; they have parties at home every week-end. The rest of the week they're out every night. But my mother thinks our home is too beautiful for anyone but her and her friends to visit. "I bring my friends in anyway, and we have parties of our own. Do you think I am right in doing so? Or should I obey my parents? "BUBBLES"

Get Their Consent — My Dear "Bubbles"—Probably you are old enough to have heard the expression, "Do as I say and not as I do." That is the precept your parents are practicing—and it's not to be recommended! In fact, there isn't much I can say in their defense, except that both of them work hard in order to provide you with such a nice home and nice clothes, and that you should be grateful enough to them not to go against their wishes. If your friends behave themselves when they visit you, I can't see what harm there is in their doing so, but it would be much better if you had your mother's or father's consent. Why not try to obtain it before you entertain again? You'd feel much easier if you did.
