Charles R. Forsman 84, of Sewell went peacefully on Friday, February 7, 2020. dam for the lake in the conservation area, his re-build of the famous teahouse and his creation and restoration of countless trails. The historic train station refurbishment was yet another project of his! Chuck worked with attorneys and local officials to obtain permanent ownership for the Borough of Wenonah of conservation lands that make up the "Ring of Green" that surrounds the town.

In 2010 Chuck pioneered the campaign to preserve the old and abandoned golf course aside of Wenonah from its conversion into a housing development. As "The Friends of Maple Ridge" they assembled a coalition of government and private entities to secure what is now Gloucester County's first state preserve -Tall Pines State Reserve.

Chuck's most recent memorable event was becoming the Wenonah Hometown Legend which recognizes a current or former resident who "inspires legends, instills pride, and serves as a role model for the people of Wenonab"

It goes without saying ... everyone will miss his endless energy, his quick wit, and his deep love and loyalty to family and friends. If you didn't catch him as Chuckles Chuck the Clown for 30 years at the Wenonah July 4th Parade, you might find him fishing, skiing, dancing with Lorrie, playing bocce ball, driving fast cars, and of course, wearing his signature cowboy hat.
